Democracy Day from May 29 to June 12 of every year to commemorate the debacle of June, 1993 when a popular electoral process was truncated while on course to a happy ending, events of the day have included remembrances and tributes to gallant Nigerians whose sacrifices ensured that democracy took root on Nigerian soil. Democracy heroes notably *Chief M.K.O Abiola GCFR* who was cruising to electoral victory on the cusp of the popular and overwhelming mandate Nigerian electorate across all the divides gave him, are remembered on *Democracy Day* and their efforts in birthing democracy once again since the demise of the second republic, are reiterated for posterity.

June 12, 2024 was no different. Other pro-democracy legends who staked their-all to confront successive military regimes to a stand-still like *Chief Gani Fewehinmi*, *Dr Beko Ransome-Kuti*, *Alhaji Balarabe Musa*, *Chima Ubani*, *Uba Sani*, Shehu Sani and all other pro-democracy, human rights and labour activists scoperating under different canopies of activism were

Kaduna State and *President Bola Ahmed Tinubu* have many things in common: Two stand out clearly; both were in the trenches and suffered so many indignities in the hands of the military regimes on account of their activism and both happened now to be heading governments (*President Tinubu started much earlier*) meriting the tag 'Democrats in the saddle'.

This edition of *Kaduna Outlook* is devoted to an assessment by independent commentators of *Senator Uba Sani's* stewardship against the background of the special day in which he, along with other stalwarts of the fight to keep the flame of democracy alight are being celebrated. How has he fared in this dispensation, has he walked the talk and what in particular is the significance of the day to Kaduna State now that a democrat is at the helm, have been the focus. This is packaged in form of a major interview by an academic who has seen it all, news features, comments and snippets that highlight what the day means to the people and the role of personae involved in the struggle for democracy such as *Senator Uba Sani*.

Kaduna democracy dividends: People have to be patient with Govt - Prof. Laah

Professor Gambo Laah, is a Professor of population geography at the Kaduna State University and a commentator on public affairs. He was a former Head of Department of Geography, former Dean of Faculty of Science and former Dean of School of Postgraduate Studies Kaduna State University. He is the pioneer Vice Chancellor, Greenfield University Kaduna. **Prof Laah** is a member of the Academic Advisory Committee of the National Institute for Policy and Strategic Studies, Kuru Jos. He is Chairman, Industry Relations, Kaduna State University and the 2nd Vice President of the Association of Nigerian Geographers. He holds the traditional title of Iyan Mabushi, in Atyap Chiefdom in Kaduna State. He spoke on the occasion of Nigeria Democracy Day on a wide range issues including viability of democracy, gale of changes in politial fortunes across ther world, state police, voter sophistry, federalism and the North response to it, Uba Sani among others in an in-depth interview with **Emmanuel Ado**, a media consultant to the Kaduna State Government.

Question: After what seems like years of decline, countries across the world are in 2024 voting for democracy. Millions of voters around the world from India to South Africa recently went to the polls to elect their leaders. What are some key takeaways?

Prof. Laah: Let me say that i am happy to be part of the celebration of democracy, the return to civilian rule after years of military dictatorship, because we have finally said bye- bye to military dictatorship and embraced democracy as the way to go. The world has definitely come of age in embracing democracy which has led to critical development at levels that we have not seen before. This year we have seen elections in different countries, but the key and sad thing is that we are having a shift to the far right which is very alarming, alarming in the sense that when the British people voted to exit the European Union-Brexit, it was on the grounds that they wanted their government to concentrate on them, that their government must take care of them before others. This has serious implications for the world. Migration - this concept of Japa, migration is no doubt a major



issue in Europe and it would lead to harsh laws...the Europeans are beginning to tighten their borders - they don't want immigrants coming in anymore. What that means is that we have to develop our country to prevent our people from the humiliation of migration. But I can tell you that although we have had challenges, we have issues, but there has

house in order. The we before others, far right rhetoric of the likes of Donald Trump is real. As a people we must begin to think inward and harness our resources and stop trading our natural resources without adding value. I think, it is a good thing that - the BJP in India suffered a defeat in the election, although they still have the majority of seats. The African National Congress (ANC) equally suffered a crushing defeat that it needed to go into an alliance to form a government. This is an indication that the people are beginning to assert themselves and not necessarily that they are questioning the foundation of their democracy. In Senegal we can interpret the voting as a vote against continued colonialism. The people seem to have said it loud and clear let's move away from colonial mentality and develop our selves. What the United States and the other developed countries are telling us Africans, but especially Nigerians is that we need to work on developing our countries.

Question: In South Africa ANC lost their majority and in Nigeria the All Progressives Congress (APC) defeated the People's Democratic Party (PDP) and they have so far held sway for eight years, and another four years down the line, so what does this say about the Nigerian electorate?

Prof. Laah: Yes of course, you know that first and foremost, we don't need to be questioning the legality of the election of President Bola Tinubu as that has been settled, it was clear that Nigerians were fed up with the impunity of the PDP and they decided to change them and that was the first time an opposition party would officially taking over governance from a party that had kept describing itself as the largest party in Africa. It's instructive that the people didn't question the electoral process in 2015, because it was clear to everybody, that the will of the people prevailed. In 2023 it was not as clear as it was in 2015, but of course there is no doubt that the APC won the elections. So, voters are using their power from India to South Africa.

Question: You're a consultant to the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC). What's the magic because votes are finally beginning to count, we are no longer having those scandalous numbers like we use to. Is this a sign that we making progress?

Prof. Laah: We are making progress, in the sense that the number of people that voted were those who registered, it is a significant improvement, though we have laxity in voters registration between the ages of 18 to 25 as they are still not showing sufficient interest in voting, but If you compare with the 2007, 2023, 2011 voting there is a significant and progressive improvement in the proportion of young people who have registered to vote and it would be great if the Identity Card, the BVN, and ATM cards are harmonized into one ID, it would lead to significant improvement in voting. We don't need all these different cards. We need to continue on voters' advocacies. And I would support the scrapping of state electoral commissions...

Question: But we are talking of true federalism, won't that negate

structure or national architecture in some areas, just as true federalism does not imply having a separate military or foreign affairs ministry... these areas are settled, but that is not to say we don't need a state police. If you introduce state police it would help maintain the electoral process, because a state will now be able to use its own police to maintain order because they understand the environment very well. So if we have state police we can even gamble to allow the state electoral commissions to remain intact, but where we have the police under the federal government we can't have an effective state electoral system because the police as presently constituted are not answerable to the state governors who are the chief security officers of their respective states.

Question: But if you have a state police will it not be the same scenario? The fear in some quarters is that state police would be manipulated by the state governor against the opposition?

Prof. Laah: No, it will not because there will be checks, and the federal government will still maintain some presence in the states. It has a duty to ensure the continued corporate existence of the country, so they would not tolerate the idea of a state governor using state police to go after the opposition, so to me state police is a gain, I wholeheartedly support state police. And I must commend Governor Uba Sani for his consistency on the matter.

Question: The two recent elections in Africa Senegal and that of India, especially the election of the President Bassirou Faye who was a prisoner, and India's BJP party not winning outright majority and South Africa's ANC which had to go into an alliance are these warning signals that voters are becoming more daring?

Prof. Laah: In fact, let me take the case of Senegal, President Bassirou Faye was in prison, and because the forerunner Ousmane Sonko was disqualified from running so he was drafted to run. The key factor is that the people made the point that they want to be truly independent. Remember that the president was a tax collector and has asserted that the taxes being collected candrive the development of Senegal. Taxes can drive development, just like grants can help run the universities. Last year, Lagos State University attracted over a billion naira grant for research. So, universities must invest in internet connectivity and power in their institutions to enable their lecturers attract grants.

Question: Give me your honest assessment of 25 years of democracy in Nigeria?

Prof. Laah: To be honest, we have grown, I'm not among those who think that nothing good has happened in Nigeria. No, we have grown, before 2000 we didn't have GSM, so if somebody died someone would have had to travel to inform his family. It might look insignificant, but it's a big leap. And being a democratic country has opened doors for us as a country and a people. We certainly have made progress in 25 years. The freedom you enjoy is something that can't be quantified.

Question: So, in real terms, because you've talked about tangibles and intangibles. Let's talk about the 25 years anniversary in real terms?

Prof. Laah: Of course. Remember we had three candidates, and the people made their decision. In fact, many members of the PDP

Prof. Laah: In real terms, we can talk about infrastructural developments and the conducive environment for the private sector, don't mind the economic crisis which is world-wide.

Question: But virtually every part of the country is challenged?

Prof. Laah: Every part of the country is challenged. Yes, the South East is tragically challenged because of the IPOB problem, the Niger Delta has its own problems and, in the North, we have the crippling security situation. I absolutely agree with you. President Umaru Yar'adua initiated the amnesty deal which I must confess worked. I know some people are canvassing that it should be replicated in resolving the issues in all the troubled regions, including banditry. We need more boots on the ground. But we are making progress...apart from Dangote refinery, there are others coming on stream. The Dangote refinery is a game changer.

Prof. Laah: Well it's challenging, that does not mean that the jobs are not being created. If you look at the report of the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) it will confirm this as a fact. The only problem is that it is not proportionate to our population and that is definitely a challenge. It's the private sector that can create jobs, not the government. The federal government has only 1.2 million people in its employment.

Question: What are the traits that you are seeing from both elected officials and the electorate?

Prof. Laah: Now, let's understand one thing, the impunity of the win at all cost madness during elections is becoming a thing of the past. Why? Because the judiciary has reversed a lot of what happened during the elections. So, the signal that is coming out from such an arrangement is that people are becoming wary of rigging. It's only a matter of time before the electoral system is fully refined. Kaduna State did introduce electronic voting machines and I'm sure the federal government can do that. If you look at the Labour Party the obedient movement and what they achieved there is hope. It shows a new a new orientation. In Kaduna State poor aspirants defeated some members of the House of Representatives...no one saw that coming.

Question: In Kaduna state, APC lost the presidential elections. PDP took the three senatorial seats, but they won the governorship. What does that say?

Prof. Laah: That's the dynamics of enlightened voters, who in the presidential election voted Atiku Abubakar and in the governorship for Senator Uba Sani.

Question: So, voters are becoming sophisticated?

Prof. Laah: Absolutely yes. They understand the importance of capacity and that is the kind of sophistication we want. So, in Kaduna State all the senators are PDP, but the APC sprinted a surprise by claiming the majority in the state house and by winning the governorship. They casted their lot with Uba Sani who had invested in them through his foundation and had performed creditably well at the senate.

Question: This says a lot about Senator Uba Sani?

came out openly in support of Senator Uba Sani, but they didn't withdraw their membership of PDP. It is a good sign that we are beginning to discriminate based on capacity.

Question: What in your opinion have been the high and the low points of the 25 years of democracy?

Prof. Laah: Well, let me start with the low point. The lingering security challenge remains the number one. The issue of the socalled yahoo yahoo-boys and its associated problems. Nigeria has acquired a terrible reputation because of their activities. We have survived despite our challenges and that shows our resilience. There is no country that will be exposed to the challenges Nigeria has faced and survive. Moving forward what is required is for government to provide the enabling environment for people to achieve their goals. It is not the responsibility of government to provide jobs, its responsibility to provide enabling environment for jobs to be created. How many jobs can the Federal Government provide? We have only 1.2 million workers in the federal government. So, if the NLC is fighting for the increase in salary for these 1.2 million workers, it must note that they are insignificant compared to about 230 million people who have nothing to do with government. Even the workers at the state level amount to nothing when compared to the rest of the population. Our most important mainstay is agriculture. Not many people remember that in 2015, 2016, 2017 most of those who performed Hajj were farmers, and not civil servants.

Question: The high points...

Prof. Laah: The high point is that we have developed our capacity, our international ranking has increased. We have continued to manage our differences. We have the highest number of medical personnel in UK, in US and that says something about our educational system. We have not done well with the power situation. It's sad to see the high rate of vandalism...the rails tracks are being stolen.

Question: President Bola Tinubu slowly is working on restructuring the country, for instance, the Electricity Act of 2023 which allows states to generate electricity has been signed into law, and the process towards amending the constitution to allow for the establishment of community police which Governor Sani has been in the forefront championing is ongoing. What do you want to say about the entrenchment of true federalism?

Prof. Laah: Unfortunately, the North has been very suspicious of true federalism. And why is the North suspicious of true federalism? The argument has always centered around resource control. Unfortunately, a lot of people think that once you have true federalism that they will not benefit from certain resources, but that is not true. Before crude oil became the mainstay of Nigeria's economy it was agriculture. The South -West was not built on petroleum, it was cocoa, the North did not make its name from petrol but groundnut. The South East was rubber and palm oil. So, I think the emphasis on crude oil,

which has a shelf life due to environmental concerns and with the advent of electric cars, shows that it would soon be past tense.

Question: So, just like many other commentators you also believe his one year has been impactful?

Question: Is that beginning to happen?

Prof. Laah: Of course, it is beginning to happen.

Question: In Kaduna state, Senator Uba Sani, a democrat is in the saddle. He was very active in the campaign against military dictatorship. Give me your thoughts on this. There must be a difference when battle tested generals lead the war against poverty, against unemployment, increased agricultural production.

Prof. Laah: I like the way you introduced Senator Uba Sani, he is a damn good politician. Politics has to do with your temperament, your antecedents, your presentation the way you see issues and the way your present issues. He has calmed nerves by some simple actions...his empathy and this is what a good leader does. Once elections are over you become the governor of all. Governor Uba has tried to be fair in the siting of projects, people have a sense of belonging. I don't know how is managing to execute the projects because of the financial crisis the state is facing. Governor Sani is reaching out to people and that's strategic. ...it's the reason why the people have embraced him. Some weeks ago, the Kaduna State University wanted to stop students that hadn't paid their fees from writing their exams when the governor heard about it, he intervened as the Visitor. He directed the university to allow them write their exams while they made efforts to pay. So, if they had been disallowed from writing the exams, it would have been devastating, because they would have lost a semester. I can tell you that the directive brought a lot of excitement in the exam halls and to many parents. So, they wrote their exams and they would pay before collecting their results.

Look at the various road projects, in fact look at the lithium factory, and the other projects he has attracted using his network...the Qatar project which is massive. He is a quiet achiever ...am also aware of the critical road project from Zonkowa to Zaria.

Question: So, his Rural transformation agenda is key...

Prof. Laah: Honestly, his rural transformation agenda is brilliant, and well thought out, because the moment you invest in rural transformation, you would have reduced the pressure on the urban centers. We are not seeing the benefits of the urban renewal because of the rural-urban migration. But once the rural areas are made habitable people will have no reason to come to Kaduna where their quality of life will be zero, where they will suffer from pollution. So, the governor is spot-on in focusing on the rural areas, because once you develop the rural areas, you would have stopped migration to the urban center and this would impact on agriculture. Why should I come to Kaduna if I have power, good roads and the incentives to increase my production? You need to go to Samaru Kataf to see the vocational technology city. I like the fact that he is doing something drastically different from the

Prof. Laah: Very, very impactful in every respect. Psychologically you can't quantify what his inclusiveness has done and this can't be measured. People are feeling more relaxed. And this is key. And I must say that the security situation has improved and would continue to improve because the governor is determined to ensure that his citizens are safe.

Question: You already hinted at the paucity of funds and what he is doing....

Prof. Laah: I don't know, but the governor must be a magician. Governor Uba Sani has shown that lean resources cannot be an impediment, that one can still make an impact once the commitment is there. I wonder how he is doing it, but I certainly know that projects are going on simultaneously in Zone I, in Zone II and Zone III.

Question: Don't you think is financial discipline?

Prof. Laah: I think so. I have heard people complain that he was more generous as a senator than as a governor. Once he saw the financial situation he adjusted. He refused to buy new vehicles for his commissioners and other appointees. He is equally not using new vehicles. Considering the economic situation, it would have been economically disastrous for him to purchase new vehicles. So, I see him as someone that is prudent. He deserves commendation for prompt payment of salaries and for executing projects.

Question: Finally, moving forward what areas would you want the governor to focus on?

Prof. Laah: I want both the federal and state governments to really look at agricultural and rural development. We must find a final solution to the farmers/header's crisis. I know a lot of people are opposed to the ban on open grazing, sincerely speaking, as a cattle farmer you can't get the benefit from open grazing because the cows can never do well. If you go to Kenya where they have a structured farming system people are benefitting from grazing, they have more milk, more cheese because the animals are healthier because they are not being moved from one place to another which reduces their milk and meat. So, to a large extent, I support the ban on open grazing but I would want to see government invest in ranches for cattle farmers.

Question: What's your message to the good people of Kaduna state? Prof. Laah: Well, I like the Kaduna people be to continue to give Senator Uba Sani their unflinching support, they need to be more patient, they need to also understand that the times are hard. And I think if we can have this at the back of our mind, because when we talk of security, it is not people from space, that will come and help us tackle the problem, because security starts with us - when you see something you say something to the right person, that in itself will be okay. We need to avoid vandalizing government properties like the street lights, the traffic lights which people knock down with reckless abandon.

The significance of June 12 to Kaduna State

t is generally agreed that the significance of June 12, 1993 in Nigeria is in the fact that an estimated 14 million Nigerians set aside ethnic, religious, class, and regional Affiliations, to elect their president with the hope of ending several years of military dictatorship.

It is against this backdrop that in 2018, President Muhammadu Buhari moved Democracy Day from May 29 to June 12 in honour of the winner of that election, Chief M.K.O Abiola, who was denied of his victory, and "to remind all Nigerians of denial of their rights and their choice."

One of the most significant consequences of June 12 election annulment was that the struggle to deannul birthed many pro-democracy groups most of which coalesced under NADECO (National Democratic Coalition). Many leaders of the current Fourth Republic emerged from NADECO. Of particular significance and interest to Kaduna state is the incumbent governor, His Excellency, Sen Uba Sani.

Governor Uba Sani was one of the leading lights of the democratic movement that galvanized the patriotic struggle against military authoritarianism in Nigeria. He joined the movement at a time that raw bravery and patriotism were required; he joined when military dictatorship was at the apogee.

Operating from Kaduna through the Movement for Freedom and Justice which he founded, Governor UBA Sani, along with other patriots, deployed his organization and networking skills in creating a strategic base for the prodemocracy movement in Northern Nigeria.

Consequently, he played high level leadership roles as National Vice Chairman (North) of Campaign for Democracy (CD) which had over 40

affiliated groups in its fold. CD's primary goal was to advocate for a return to civilian rule through the holding of a sovereign national conference. It was a strong member of NADECO, the umbrella and face of domestic and global opposition to military authoritarianism in Nigeria. Dr Beko Ramson-Kuti was CD National Chairman while Governor Uba Sani was National Vice Chairman (North). The Chairman and many leaders were often arrested for their work. Governor Uba Sani was not spared the ordeal either. He too had his baptism of fire. He was incarcerated.

Besides CD, Governor Uba Sani worked closely with the iconoclastic Chief Gani, SAM (Senior Advocate of the Masses), as Deputy National Chairman (North) of the Joint Action Committee of Nigeria (JACON).

The involvement of the governor in the human rights and democratic movement transformed the engineer to a dye-in-the-wool democrat. It was like going through the crucible.

As if that was not enough, Governor Sani has been a very active participant in the Fourth Republic holding very strategic positions: Special Advisor on Public Affairs to President Obasanjo, Special Adviser on Political and intergovernmental affairs to Governor Nasir el-Rufai and Senator of the the Federal Republic, among others.

Therefore, Governor Uba Sani came into Sir Kashim Ibrahim House fully prepared, fully kitted physically and mentally. He is thus not a situational or an accidental Chief Executive Officer. This has enabled him to sail through the rough sea of debts and drought of funds that characterized last year, without losing focus on repositioning the state government to deliver the greatest good to over 8.4 million (2018) citizens as far as resources can carry.

The Governor himself never tires of repeating that "A major pillar of our Governance Agenda in Kaduna State is Nurturing Citizens Engagement. We want to carry the people along in decision making processes, especially on how their resources are allocated and expended".

The validity of the statement is vivid in the projects commissioned on the first anniversary, tagged 365 days of Governor Uba Sani. They were projects that directly impact on the welfare and security of the citizens and residents of the state.

The effect of the governor's active involvement in the June 12 saga is writ large in what he says and does as the Chief Executive Officer of the State. He thinks, speaks and acts inclusion and participation of all persons, irrespective of their place in society. Only a committed democrat, forged in the furnace of human rights activism and struggle again authoritarianism could be so focused. Any wonder many call him "talk and do" Governor or "Gwabna mai alheri"?

Indeed, it takes a dye in the wool democrat like H. E. Sen Uba Sani to galvanize the citizens of Kaduna State, a microcosm of Nigeria, to set aside aside political party, ethnic, religious, class, and regional affiliations for peace and development. This is the significance of June 12 to Kaduna State.

25 Years of Democracy: In Kaduna State a democrat in the saddle

he jury is still out on whether Nigeria's return to civil rule (democracy) after years of agonizing military dictatorship which on May 29th marked its silver jubilee, has met the aspirations of most Nigerians. As would be expected there are and would continue to be divergent opinions as to whether Nigerians fared better under military rule or are faring better under democratic rule. But what is not under dispute is the very high expectations of Nigerians that she would join the league of developed countries because of its human, and material resources. Without doubt she is still confronted with several teething challenges ranging from insurgency, economic, political uncertainty, high rate of unemployment, poor infrastructural facilities 64 years after her independence in 1960 from Britain.

The misconception that largely informs the position of those that write off civilian rule is the wrong notion that democracy would usher in an Eldorado, that at the swing of a magic wand hunger, poverty etc would vanish just like that. But where this so, America the bastion of democracy would not have millions of homeless people, over 6.6 million unemployed people or be grappling with the tremendous challenges that Donald Trump the presumptive candidate of the Republican Party has thrown up which is sending Americans back to the drawing board.

While the last 25 years of civilian rule might not have met the expectations of many Nigerians there is absolutely no question that democracy remains the best form of governance with all its imperfections, especially as the history of the military regimes continually being pushed by some military apologists is not that glorious. What is left is for the political class to work resolutely to continue to solve the numerous challenges - entrenching a true federalism.

The train has left the station, and the military have submitted to civilian authority. It's fitting that the democracy day is being celebrated on June 12th in commemoration of the 1993 presidential election won by the late Chief MKO Abiola

which General Ibrahim Babangida annulled.

While many of the beneficiaries of the gains of democracy especially the class of 1999 governors, ministers and most members of the National Assembly were either onlookers or active collaborators with the military and who deep down continue to prefer military rule because of the benefits they derived from their association with the military junta almost elbowed the likes of President Bola Tinubu, and Governor Uba Sani of Kaduna State who were in the trenches waging the relentless war against the military from participating in the politics of the 4th Republic.

Governor Sani, who as a young man had already decided on a life dedicated to public service, the institution of an egalitarian society and the entrenchment of democracy when most of his mates were unsure of what they wanted to do with their life

At that young age, Governor Sani found military rule objectionable but didn't just sit back to complain, rather he took active steps to help send the military back to the barracks where they rightly belong despite the obvious personal risks. The danger that the young Sani faced is better appreciated against the background of the fact that the likes of the famed General Alani Akinrinade, Anthony Enahoro and Bola Ahmed Tinubu (as he then was) were eventually forced into exile through the famous NADECO route by the Abacha regime, which in Nigeria's history, remains the most vicious regime. That Uba Sani stayed back to wage the war speaks volumes about his courage and convictions.

In a sense, Sani's involvement in the prodemocracy movement was what the one and only irrepressible Fela Aníkúlápó Kútì in his diabolical sense of humor would have described as suicide; akin to someone standing in front of a moving train.

Governor Sani, for a long time, was a lone voice in the North campaigning for the restoration of late Chief M. K. O Abiola's June 12 mandate, which Babangida had annulled, until Col. Abubakar Umar resigned his commission over the annulment of the June 12 elections. He was the National Vice Chairman (North) Campaign for Democracy (CD), and Deputy National Chairman (North) of the Gani Fawehinmi SAN Joint Action Committee (JACON) and member of the National Conscience Party (NCP). Governor Sani has definitely paid his dues. Clearly, Sani's experience in the trenches explains his incredible value of the service to humanity and skills at navigating delicate landmines as the governor of Kaduna State. His peaceful disposition is the reason why Yusuf Hamisu Abubakar, who defeated him for the People's Democratic Party (PDP), senate ticket in 2011 is today his political ally and confidant.

Collectively, the checklist is wide and diverse but a common nomenclature connects them to a political register. Loosely, tarring of roads, building edifices and constructing culverts, as well as block of classrooms, are called Dividends of Democracy in Nigeria. Indeed, at every milestone, politicians reel out these brick and mortar achievements with fanfare. Last week, they were in their elements and a festive air, across party lines, pervaded the entire polity as public officers unveiled their scorecards on or before May 29th. At once, there was a publicity overdrive, in the mainstream and social media, as they rolled out the drums, clicked glasses and thumped their chests to boot.

Last week, the Kaduna State Governor. Senator Uba Sani, commissioned a slew of projects, flagged off news ones and inspected ongoing projects in rapid sequence, without catching his breath. Indeed, the Rural Transformation Agenda, his flagship programmed, is gathering momentum as over 54 road project contracts, in just one year, have been awarded by the administration. Similarly, the Government has attracted sundry investments, spanning the mining, agro-allied and housing sectors, from domestic and foreign investors, as well

Soya Bean Oil Refining Plant, located at Kutungare village, is underway and Sunagrow International Oil Ltd has promised 500,000 liters per day. Similarly, a Liquefied Natural Gas production company, the Greenville LNG, has cited a 24,000 tones capacity facility at Kakau, a village in Chikun local government of Kaduna State. Besides, the United Arab Emirates (UAE) has promised multimilliondollar private investments, especially in the Agriculture, Infrastructure, Transportation and Clean Energy. Additionally, the Emirati Government pledged to address some development challenges.

Unarguably, the Senator Uba Sani administration, in the last one year, has built infrastructure, attracted investments, rebooted the health sector and upgraded education facilities. Likewise, his 'A Kori Talauci' promises a tall order of banishing poverty from Kaduna State. Indeed, the Government has punched above its financial weight, against paucity of funds, a debt overhang and competing demands. Similarly, town hall meetings are sounding boards for policy initiation, implementation and feedbacks.

In 1991, Bill Clinton and Al Gore ran for the United States presidency, on a joint ticket, with the slogan "Putting People First." As Governor, Senator Uba Sani is putting the people of Kaduna State on the front burner of his policies and programmes. This is the real Dividends of Democracy.

Kaduna ginger farmers receive FG's support worth N1.6bn

n a bid to support smallholder ginger farmers who suffered losses from the ginger epidemic in 2023, Governor Uba Sani Monday flagged off the distribution of recovery support packages to over 5,000 farmers from seven local governments in the zone.

The packages, valued at 1.6 billion naira, were donated by the National Agricultural Development Fund, a federal government agency as part of a comprehensive intervention to recover ginger production and support

farmers who lost their livelihoods. Each of the 5000 farmers will receive a support package that includes 4 bags of NPK and 2 bags of Urea fertilizer, as well as two bags of maize and sorghum seeds and herbicides sufficient to cultivate one hectare of farmland.

This initiative aims to help the farmers plant alternative crops during the current cropping season.

The Deputy Governor of Kaduna State, Dr Hadiza Sabuwa Balarabe represented the Governor at the flag off of the distribution of the items at Kachia, at an event attended by the Executive Secretary of the National Agricultural Development Fund, representative of the Food and Agriculture Organisation, Commissioners of Agriculture and Business Innovation and Technology among other government officials and other dignitaries.

Dr Balarabe announced that a more comprehensive support package was underway for both smallholder and big ginger farmers to help recover ginger production in the state.

would be a much better place if activists take active interest in governance, having pushed the military back to their barracks, because the challenge is in delivering the goods.

And Sani has delivered. For instance, as Chairman of the powerful Senate Committee on Banking, Finance, Insurance and Other Financial Institutions, despite being a first termer, he authored three consequential bills that President Muhammadu Buhari signed into law, a record by any first termer. The Braille curriculum has 8 modules made, to ensure proper translation that will enable the delivery of the desired quality knowledge to the learners, the participants were divided into four (4) different groups to validate the document during the technical session. By this segmentation each group tackled two modules with the Braille experts reading the Braille while are sighted persons supported them by going through the Life skills safe space hard copies. Others assisted in taking notes of the corrections, additions or subtractions needed on

both curricula. Four modules were reviewed on the first day of the session while the second batch of four modules were reviewed the following day.

The Kaduna AGILE also had a two-day e n g a g e m e n t w i t h Environmental/Climate Change officers to discuss how to collaborate to impact quality knowledge to the learners during the life skills sessions in the safe's spaces.

The life skills training is delivered under the AGILE Project, through the "Safe Space" approach to enable girls to navigate through adulthood successfully using trained mentors with well-developed and validated curriculum that cover topics in negotiation, leadership, climate change, menstrual hygiene management, nutrition and reproductive health in 114 schools across the 23 LGAs with 6,025 girls as beneficiaries.

Kaduna moves to mitigate NIMET prediction on flooding

aduna State Governor, Senator Uba Sani has directed stakeholders to come up with the best way to mitigate the potential impact of flooding in areas identified by the Nigerian Meteorological Agency (NiMet,) in the State.

The Commissioner of Environment and Natural Resources, Abubakar Buba disclosed this during a sensitization campaign held at the Lagos Garage Mando in Igabi Local Government Area. According to him, Gov. Sani directed the Ministry and other stakeholders to look at all the proactive measures to be taken to avert the flood, and part of it is sensitization, which all the MDAs of the State have started to work on for the past two to three months.

Buba reiterated that the team decided to kick-start the campaign at a center like Mando Motor Park, which is highly populated and the exercise is to distill all the drainage.

He added that the project 'Distilling Drainage' is a Kaduna Agro-Climatic Resilience in Semi-Arid Landscapes (KAD-ACReSAL) supported by the World Bank.

"Since it is the rainy season, we have decided to distill all the drainages within the city center and the three senatorial zones, Kaduna, Kafanchan, and Zaria Metropolis. We are going to distill 160,000 meters of drainage within the City centers of the three senatorial zones."

"In doing this, we are sure that by the

time the rain comes to its peak, it will have a way to flow back into the river which can prevent any likely occurrence in the State."

"We call on Citizens of Kaduna State to ensure that they cooperate with the Government by coming out to assist, and also stop disposing of garbage in the drainage system and also ensuring that they keep their areas clean so that together with the efforts of the Government, it will be a success."

"All the flood-prone areas have been drainage systems and the only thing is that most of the drainage is blocked. We involve the people in the work we are doing so that at the end of the day, sustainability can be achieved," the Commissioner said

"There's a monitoring and evaluation team which comprises of all the stakeholders, KEPA, SEMA, and others from the LGA Council and even the traditional rulers and also the youths, men and women of the community will be involved. We are going round to ensure that it is a success and everybody will participate in it," he added.

Speaking earlier, Jibril Dahiru Rufa'i of KAD-ACReSAL said the project is World Bank-assisted aimed at addressing the challenges of land degradation and climate Change in Northern Nigeria on a multidimensional scale.

According to him, the ACReSAL Project will help restore 1 million hectares of degraded land in the northern part of the country.

"The Project will also help reduce the

vulnerability of millions of extremely poor people in northern Nigeria, strengthening their role in line with achieving environmental sustainability. "Today we are participating as key stakeholders in distilling Drainage as proactive measures to flooding." he said. In his remarks, the Executive Secretary of, the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA,) Muhammed Mu'azu Mukaddas said for the last six weeks, "we've been moving around with KEPA and other key Stakeholders, trying to sensitise the citizens on the need to be safe and at the same time, mitigate the

flood highlighted areas."

Similarly, the Managing Director of Kaduna State Environmental Protection Authority (KEPA,) Dr Yakubu Yusuf Arrigasiyyu explained that the target of the operation is to distill all drainage in the state so that there is free flow of water to avoid any blockage that can cause damages to the houses or flooding.

Kaduna spends N19.9bn on pension, others in one year - Pension Bureau

aduna state government said it has within the first year under the administration of Governor Uba Sani, spent N19.9 billion on pension, gratuity, and death benefits

Executive Secretary of Kaduna Pension Bureau, Professor Salamatu Idris Isah disclosed this on Thursday, June 13, at a One Day Sensitization on Data Recapture Exercise for Kaduna State Public Servants under the Contributory Pension Scheme (CPS).

The sensitization which was organised by the Kaduna State Pension Bureau in collaboration with the Pension Funds Administrators (PFAs) operating in the State, has in attendance representatives of civil servants from all the MDAs in the state.

Speaking to journalists shortly after the programme where the PFAs and officials of the Pension Bureau made presentations on the importance of accurate data to seamless pension payments, Professor Isah urged civil servants to perfect their records to avoid challenges after retirement.

She said though the state was still facing the challenge of inherited pension liabilities, the Pension Bureau had between May 2023 and May 2024, expended N13 billion on the state monthly pension scheme and local government pension.

Professor Salamatu also said a total sum of N6.9 billion has been expended on gratuity payments within the same period.

According to her, "the essence of the programme is to ensure that, all Kaduna Civil Servants are well documented by the Pension Fund Administrators (PFAs), because that is the only way to ensuring a seamless receipt of their retirement benefits."

"We want to from now prevent the challenges of errors in names, BVN not tallying with the name or National Identity Number (NIN) not captured.

"The reason we had to do this data recapturing is that a good number of the civil servants were captured when there was no BVN or NIN. We also got to know that the PFAs have not been able to do data capturing properly for all the public servants of Kaduna State. Even though they have registered with the PFAs, the PFAs getting detailed information about their clients when they are retiring is significant.

"So, with this sensitization, civil servants who have not done proper registration with their PFAs will know what to do. From the presentations, the civil servants have been told what and what they need to do."

Giving a breakdown of pension expenses, the Executive Secretary said, "From May 2023 to May 2024, the current government has expended N13billion. In the state monthly pension scheme, we have expended seven billion Naira, while the local government has expended five billion Naira, making the N13billion

"In the area of gratuity payment, we have expended N6.9billion. So, that is quite a lot within one year. And we have paid over 2,000 people in terms of gratuity and death benefits in the new and old scheme."

She however noted that the only challenge was the huge liabilities the state has to settle. "Though the liabilities have reduced drastically, it is still something that we need to put more efforts into, especially since we have disengaged teachers that have not received their gratuities and death benefits," she added.


